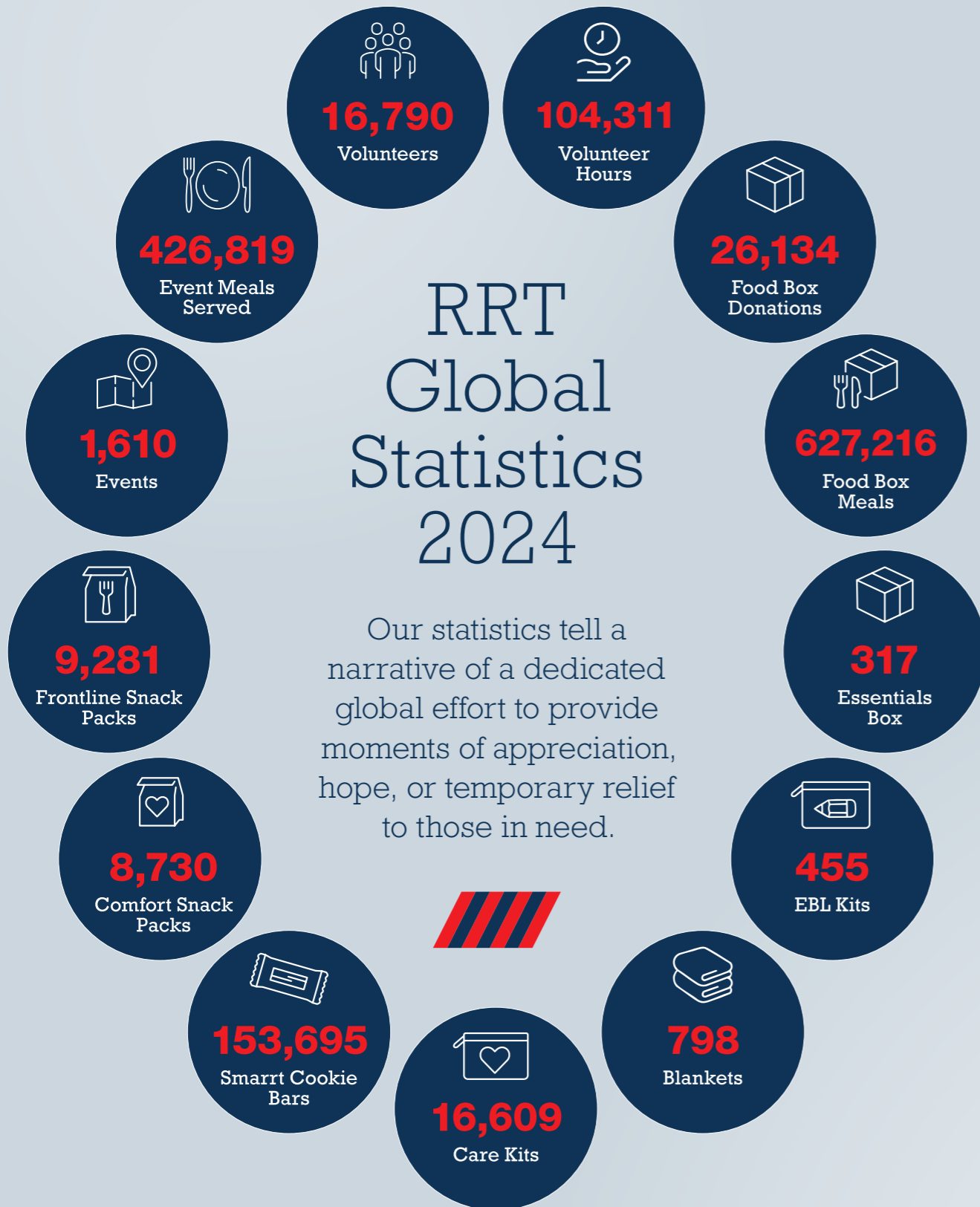

Global Managing Director's Report

A groundswell of momentum has defined our global efforts since 2022. So, it is fitting that 2024 has been a year of milestones, with RRT back in full swing, returning to pre-pandemic event levels after the necessity of pivoting to product donations. This momentum is particularly evident in our volunteer hours which increased by 43% over last year, reaching a record 104,311 hours. Another significant milestone was our ongoing support for the crisis in Ukraine having raised over GBP9 million and delivered 14.5 million meals since March 2022.

This year, RRT responded to a diverse range of emergencies and disasters. The first major deployments included multi-day responses to severe storms in South-East Queensland, Australia, and the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapse in Baltimore, US. During hurricane season, volunteers from the Caribbean and San Antonio provided critical support to emergency crews and residents affected by Hurricane Beryl. Just months later, our US teams were back in action, providing disaster relief following Hurricane Helene. While in Europe, our volunteers carried out their largest response to date, assisting firefighters battling a devastating blaze in Vidauban, southern France. The year concluded with RRT AU's 32nd Farmers Community Connect event, where drought-stricken farmers in South Australia received donations of livestock feed.

The closer collaboration that has driven our growth is reflected in the theme of this year's Annual Review, Global Vision, Local Mission. We have strengthened the connection between our global teams by sharing experiences, knowledge, and ideas through regular meetings designed to promote and support local implementation.

This approach was the foundation of our first-ever global campaign for International Nurses Day. Through this initiative, we provided 40,000 moments of appreciation by delivering meals to recognise nurses and medical staff, whose tireless contributions to our communities often goes unnoticed.

By taking a united approach, we have empowered our teams, built capacity through structured campaign frameworks, and amplified our impact. Our Global Communications team expanded with the addition of a dedicated graphic designer, increasing our ability to develop and execute coordinated global campaigns. At the core of this effort is our commitment to maintaining brand consistency for RRT globally.

As proactive and reactive responses to community needs grow, our full-time team has expanded with the appointment of two General Managers for North America and the United Kingdom. This move will help enhance each region's response coordination, ensure alignment with our mission, improve operational efficiency, and identify new opportunities.

As we embrace a new year filled with fresh opportunities and challenges, I extend my gratitude to those who make RRT what it is today.

To our donors and corporate sponsors, your generosity fuels our impact. To our beneficiaries, thank you for trusting in our ability to support your goals and for believing in the power of collaboration to create a meaningful difference. And to our 16,790 volunteers, through every meal served, every hand extended, and every act of kindness, you bring joy, relief, and hope to those we serve. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to giving back to our communities where we live and work.

RRT's aim is to support governments, charities, and emergency services in times of need. We provide benevolent support across **four key areas of focus**.



Emergency & Disaster Relief

RRT provides highly regarded rapid support to emergency services and frontline workers by offering volunteers and equipment, as well as quality food and by refreshments.

OUR AIM: to provide tangible action to agencies in times of crisis through RRT's unique assets and initiatives.



Youth

RRT is aware that our youth is the hope of our future. Therefore, we work with youth-focused charities to achieve their goals, develop unique initiatives, or provide quality catered events.

OUR AIM: to support and empower young people to excel beyond adversity.



Health & Disability

RRT collaborates with government-based organisations and charities to support a diverse range of initiatives. This includes fundraising and raising awareness for medical research and disease cures, empowering individuals with disabilities, and providing moments of appreciation for carers and medical staff.

OUR AIM: to collaborate with organisations to support their fundraising efforts, empower the disabled, or appreciate frontline workers.



Homelessness, Poverty, & Hardship

RRT works with charitable organisations that seek to bridge the gap for those experiencing homelessness or hardship. We support these efforts with catered meals and the donation of essential items.

January – June

JAN

RRT Australia coordinated 55 volunteers to help clear 3,000 cubic metres of debris over seven days after severe storms hit SE Queensland.

RRT New Zealand donated a NZ\$3,000 state-of-the-art training device to Oamaru Hospital.



FEB

RRT New Zealand provided 580 meals to support firefighters battling a blaze near Port Hills, Christchurch.

RRT Argentina supported the 15th anniversary of the Special Protection Unit, Santa Fe.

RRT United Kingdom were engaged by emergency crews responding to an unexploded WWII bomb site.

RRT Australia served over 2,000 meals supporting emergency crews battling multiple blazes in Victoria.



MAR

RRT Germany donated a EU\$3,000 PELI spotlight to Langenfeld Fire Department to enhance their emergency support efforts.

RRT North America supported 16 agencies with 1,300 meals when the Francis Scott Key Bridge collapsed in Baltimore.



APR

RRT Germany donated 150 Care Kits to the Solingen Women's Shelter.

RRT North America supported emergency services and residents of Iowa after multiple tornadoes hit the Midwest.

RRT United Kingdom served 360 members of the Royal Berkshire Fire Rescue Service at a terrorist simulation.



MAY

RRT Global provided 40,000 meals across 10 countries in recognition of International Nurses Day.

RRT New Zealand pledged a NZ\$1.5 million donation for a major upgrade to Taranaki Base Hospital delivering a new ICU wing.

RRT United Kingdom provided meals to over 10,000 cyclists in the 11th Tour de Bristol event.

RRT Denmark served 900 meals on Children's Aid Day, helping to raise funds for youth-focused charity Børnehjælpsdagen.



JUN

RRT New Zealand donated a 5th car to the Blue Light Youth Driver Navigator program helping disadvantaged youth qualify for their full driver's licence.

RRT Sweden collaborated with Radningsmissionen (Rescue Mission) to support 300 Ukrainian refugees located in Gothenburg.

RRT France dedicated 23 volunteers and 4,320 hours to support the Congrès Départemental honouring 1,000 firefighters.

RRT France sent 40 volunteers to provide meals for 800 firefighters battling a devastating fire in Vidauban in the south of France.



Global Timeline 2024

July – December

JUL

RRT Europe completed their largest event to date supporting Team Rynkeby's Tour de Paris. 100 volunteers helped refuel riders at four different locations.

RRT New Zealand donated NZ\$35,000 to support Wellington Free Ambulance contributing to a rapid response rescue vehicle.

RRT United States + RRT Caribbean supported multiple local communities in the wake of Hurricane Beryl.



AUG

RRT United Kingdom donated 23,000 bottles of water on the hottest day of the year through Operation Hydrate.

RRT France served 200 meals at an event for Une Rose Un Espoir Association to raise money for cancer research.



SEP

RRT Germany delivered their largest activation to support a community initiative, the Blue Light Mile event.

RRT United States assisted residents and first responders after Hurricane Helene hit the south eastern states. Meanwhile, East coast volunteers supported fire fighters battling blazes in San Bernardino, California.



OCT

RRT Australia supported Wandering Warriors over seven locations in NSW's Pollie Pedal event.

RRT New Zealand donated over NZ\$14,000 to fund five sofa beds for Whangarei Hospital's maternity unit so families can stay together while giving birth.

RRT United States continued their support for North Carolina and Tennessee communities still recovering from Hurricane Helene.

RRT France provided relief to crews and residents affected by the Givors floods in Southern France.



NOV

RRT Australia delivered aid to drought stricken South Australian farmers in their 32nd Farmers Community Connect event.

RRT Switzerland supported Future Day in Stadtspital Zürich donating Snack Packs to nursing staff and patients.



DEC

RRT Global reached a total of GP£9.2 million in donations raised to support Ukrainian refugees since March 2022.

RRT New Zealand committed NZ\$120,000 to deliver lifesaving, orthopaedic surgeries for Tongans.

RRT Sweden provided 115 pre-packaged Christmas parcels to inmates in Kristianstad, Jönköping and Nyköping.

New Zealand

RRT NZ extended vital support to Fire and Emergency New Zealand throughout January and February providing meals at 12 fire response events nationwide. Additional emergency responses included assistance during fires in Waikari Valley, Dunedin, and Waipara. We also supported Civil Defence in Gisborne and Napier following severe flooding in Wairoa.

We actively assisted emergency preparedness training exercises throughout the year. Notably, RRT NZ participated in the multi-agency 'Exercise Poseidon' hosted by NZ Defence Force, aimed at enhancing national readiness for major natural disasters. The exercise provided an opportunity to showcase our

emergency relief equipment, including our Telehandler, Rapid Sandbagger, and RRT Semi-Trailer.

We also continued our support for those impacted by Cyclone Gabrielle with another Farmers Community Connect event. Collaborating with Federated Farmers, RRT NZ assisted in supplying 240 fencing packs to those still recovering.

Closing the year on a high note, RRT NZ donated NZ\$21,000 to the Canterbury West Coast Rescue Helicopter. This contribution, made possible through funds raised from lunch sales at a community event in Greymouth, highlights the power of collaboration in strengthening emergency response services and achieving common goals.

Australia

Similarly to 2023, 2024 saw frequent storms and fires that called for **RRT AU** volunteers to be on hand to support. Over the Christmas break, 55 of our volunteers from Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland mobilised to help to clear debris and supply meals in the aftermath of severe storms that hit the SE Queensland region in December and January.

Firefighting support was focused on Western Australia, Victoria and New South Wales. Around 30 days were spent providing first responders with breakfasts, lunches or dinners. Additionally, volunteers were available to help

emergency services conduct the arduous and emotional task of rescue or recovery operations.

In another major event for the year, RRT AU delivered our 32nd Farmers Community Connect event in the Mid Murray region of South Australia. Local farmers have been subjected to the driest conditions since 1900. Over 30 volunteers assembled to transport and deliver 250 one-tonne bulka bags of livestock feed to 169 farmers, who were also invited to stay for a BBQ. This gave them the chance to connect with local service providers as well as others in their community.

United Kingdom

In 2024, **RRT UK** responded to 218 different emergency and disaster callouts providing over 60,000 meals. One of the most significant incidents was our support of emergency services dealing with a mass stabbing at Southport, which required a sustained, multi-agency response over several weeks.

In a unique situation, RRT UK volunteers from Plymouth assisted crews in a complex operation to remove an unexploded 500kg German bomb in Keyham. Over 10,000 residents were vacated from the area, making it the largest UK peacetime evacuation since World War II.

RRT UK regularly supports emergency services during training exercises. Volunteers were on-site in locations such as Bristol, assisting with an airport attack simulation, also in Legoland, Windsor for a mock

terrorist incident, Gwasanaeth, Wales for a major flood response, and a multi-agency response training for remote and hostile road collisions.

Additionally, we responded to several fire and flood incidents, including a large pub fire in Fareham, a warehouse fire in Cannock, and industrial fires in Hampshire, Merseyside, Greenbank, and Bitterne.

RRT UK also donated 10 Bleed Kits to Bristol Rovers Stadium in collaboration with Avon and Somerset police. The kits are specifically designed to handle life threatening bleeding resulting from a traumatic injury.

Our teams also attended the Emergency Services Show to showcase RRT's capability to a variety of agencies including police, fire, and ambulance services.

North America + Caribbean

Our teams in North America and the Caribbean served thousands of disaster response workers at the many incidents that occurred through the year including including tornados, hurricanes, fires and major accidents.

RRT CAR volunteers from Trinidad loaded the BBQ trailer onto a ferry, travelling to support the Tobago Emergency Management Agency dealing with an oil spill 18 kms off the island's coast.

When Hurricane Beryl hit, volunteers from all five RRT CAR localities were activated to deliver immediate relief to emergency services and resident evacuees in Jamaica, St. Vincent & Grenadines, Trinidad and Tobago, and Barbados.

We were also delighted to provide some relief to those working for the Fisheries Division of Barbados, whose livelihoods were largely destroyed as a result.

Europe (FR, DE, SE, DK, NL, CH, IT)

RRT FR volunteers dedicated 4,320 hours to support the Congrès Départemental honouring 1,000 firefighters with meals and refreshments. In the same month, they also provided assistance to 800 firefighters battling a devastating blaze in Vidauban, Southern France.

Later in the year, RRT FR worked closely with Centre Communal d'Action Sociale (CCAS) after torrential rainfall caused severe flooding in Central France. Chambon volunteers followed on soon after to assist in the clean-up efforts.

RRT DE were delighted to donate three fan heaters to the German Red Cross in Solingen valued at EU\$1,000.

The German team also donated a PELI battery powered spotlight valued at EU\$3,000 to the Langenfeld Fire Department.

At one of their biggest events, RRT DE supported the Blue Light Mile in Dillenburg, a program that brings the community together with "blue light professions", including fire departments and state and federal police to provide insights into their everyday work.

RRT SE were on site at one of Sweden's larger lakes for an oil-leak simulation exercise serving three meals over the day to Rescue Services, Police, Army,

Ambulance, Sea Rescue and the Civil Contingency Agency (MSB).

And for the fourth year, RRT SE supported the City of Helsingborg in hosting a crisis preparedness day, where locals were invited to learn more about how the city responds to crisis situations.

RRT SE was delighted to collaborate with Räddningsmissionen in an event for 300 Ukrainian refugees, who received donations of food and clothing.

While in Denmark, Copenhagen's historic, former stock exchange building, Borsen, was subject to an intense fire, **RRT DK** provided the Home Guard with RRT Snack Packs.

Argentina

Throughout the year, **RRT ARG** supported various agencies, in particular Unidad Especial de Policía de Transporte y Químicos (Special Police Unit for Witness Protection) or UEP.T.Y.Q. This unit recognised its 15th anniversary, and we were happy to provide meals for the members of this task force, whose work is vital to protecting our communities.

Youth



New Zealand

RRT NZ was delighted to continue our collaboration with the Blue Light Youth Driver Navigator program. Since 2021, RRT NZ has sponsored five vehicles to help young drivers obtain their licences. To date, our contributions total over NZ\$86,000, and have supported more than 2,700 lessons and 220 students to achieve their licences.

The Qizzle Stationery Program continued to thrive, providing subsidised stationery kits to children in 34 schools across the country. RRT NZ's donation

of NZ\$25,000 to the program, helps ease financial pressures on families, supporting students' educational success.

Additionally, RRT NZ actively supported youth-focused events throughout the year, including the Waitaki Girls' High School Employment Expo. We provided lunch for students and stallholders, fostering a positive and engaging environment for career exploration and development.

Australia

Our support of charities and collaborations with organisations helping our youth included existing partnerships and expanded into new areas, either through events or the delivery of donated products.

Volunteers connected with primary, secondary schools, youth associations, and charities in their area to understand how RRT could help address their needs. Our Early Bird Learning Kits, Smartt Cookies, Care Kits

and Food Boxes were distributed to many. We helped charities host events to raise funds or awareness for youth across multiple localities, and included NAIDOC, the Bravehearts 777 Marathon, and Boys to the Bush.

Many small schools or groups such as Creative Community Concepts promoted the importance of improving mental and physical well-being were also at the core of our youth focused activities.

United Kingdom

Through our Early Bird Learning Kits, **RRT UK** delivered 20,000 Smartt Cookie bars helping to eliminate hunger as a barrier to learning. These nutritional bars provided breakfast for children in over 60 schools nationwide.

The Early Bird Learning kits also contain workbooks, and our mascot, Cookie the Kookaburra.

Additionally, RRT UK assisted at 67 youth-focused events for children facing various forms of adversity,

with the goal of creating positive experiences. One of the highlights was when RRT Londonderry supported Foyle Down Syndrome's Family Fun Day. Held on World Down Syndrome Day, this event brings the local community together to celebrate and support the Foyle Down Syndrome Trust's vital mission. Founded in 1995, the trust, supports individuals with Down Syndrome through education, therapy, and social programs, empowering them to lead fulfilling lives.

Youth



North America + Caribbean

Teams supported the youth in Canada, USA and Caribbean at events such as Back to School events, Family days, Health Fairs and Community Unity Events. They provided meals and refreshments to attendees and also donated Food Boxes to families in need.

Europe (FR, DE, SE, DK, NL, CH, IT)

RRT FR supported several youth activities including an Aquarium visit for St. Étienne Emergency Shelter, and the Semaine Gardoise des Droits de L'Enfant's 35th anniversary of the Rights of Child Convention.

RRT DE made a donation to FortSchritt Dusseldorf, a primary school catering to children with mobility disorders. In response, the children got creative with their pencils, drawing lots of variations of RRT's mascot, Cookie the Kookaburra.

RRT DE was also delighted to support Anstoss zum Leben's Diversity Sports Day in an event that brings children and teenagers together to promote integration and inclusion.

When Friluftsrämjandet (Swedish Outdoor Association) delivered an event for local youths to experience the benefits of skiing and mountain air at Myrebacken, **RRT SE** were on hand to provide meals and help raise money for their charitable efforts.

RRT SE's support for Monika Lindstrom's One Step charity continued into its fourth year. One Step uses RRT Comfort Snack Packs to connect with vulnerable youth, opening up conversation and providing emotional support to those in need.

In May, **RRT DK** collaborated with Beredskab Øst Fire Station, serving 900 meals on Children's Aid Day helping to raise funds for Børnehjælpsdagen, a charity that supports vulnerable kids with initiatives to empower them for a prosperous adult life.

RRT DK volunteers were out in force supporting open days for Gladsaxe Fire Station where attendees were provided lunch in return for a donation to the SMILfonden (Smile Foundation), a charity that helps provide seriously ill children a better life.

And in another initiative supporting vulnerable children, RRT DK attended Farum Fire Station to help raise DKK19,000 for Børnehuset Siv, a specialised daycare centre.

Argentina

RRT ARG supported Tesla College, a school designed to provide quality education for children and adolescents living in vulnerable situations. The school provides a positive start to life, so children have every hope of realizing their full potential as adults. RRT ARG volunteers from Rosario cooked up a fabulous lunch to support Children's Day.

Health & Disability



New Zealand

RRT NZ had an impactful year supporting the health and disability sector. We hosted several appreciation events, a standout being our 320 volunteers who served over 19,840 meals at International Nurses Day events across 22 localities.

Another highlight was the Tranz Alpine Scooter Safari, where 250 riders travelled 250 km through the Southern Alps during the depths of winter to raise money for the Cancer Society of New Zealand. Our volunteers were on hand to provide riders with a much-needed hot meal, helping sustain them on this epic journey.

Additionally, we were happy to support multiple hospitals with a range of donations. Contributions included five new sofa beds for Whangarei Hospital's maternity unit, a NZ\$3,000 training arm for Oamaru Hospital, 15 pulse oximeter machines for Northland District Health Board, and the renewal of our sponsorship of the Wellington Free Ambulance service.

In a collective effort, \$1.5 million was gifted to Taranaki Health Foundation to help complete a new ICU unit at their base hospital.

Australia

RRT AU continued to deliver a range of appreciation events to the nursing and medical staff of hospitals around the country. One of the largest, collaborative efforts was recognising International Nurses Day. As part of this global campaign, RRT AU held 26 events across 20 different locations, serving 9,400 meals with the support of 340 volunteers. An additional 35 hospitals experienced appreciation events throughout the year, recognising the dedication of our medical and nursing staff, whose hard work is often underappreciated.

Another event that has become a regular fixture on the RRT AU calendar is RUOk? Day. As part of a national day of action, eight teams of RRT volunteers from Leeton, Melton, Ipswich, Warwick, and Picton helped raise awareness around the importance of conversations as a tool for suicide prevention.

United Kingdom

RRT UK remained dedicated to supporting individuals, organisations, and communities with numerous initiatives for those impacted by disability or mental health. Additionally, we ran numerous appreciation events for hard-working medical staff.

From the 'Big Jab' event in Doncaster and Police Mental Health Week in Lincolnshire to the Discharge Lounge RRT Food Box deliveries, our volunteers' efforts made a tangible difference to those in need. Throughout the year, we distributed 2,700 RRT Care Kits and served nearly 40,000 meals to those in need.

North America + Caribbean

RRT NA + CAR supported many hospitals with appreciation meals. We also supported fundraising events for other charities such as St. Jude's, Alzheimer's Foundation, Cops for Cancer and Lupus Research Alliance.

RRT CAR was delighted to participate in the global initiative to recognise International Nurses Day, delivering two events across Barbados and Kingston.

In St. Vincent and Grenadines, in the midst of exceptionally hot conditions, we organised to give away water bottles to those still without access to drinking water in the aftermath of Hurricane Beryl. RRT CAR also supported the Mental Health Committee of the Barbados Psychiatric Hospital for their annual Mental Health Fair, serving Signature Burgers to volunteers and doctors working at the facility.

Europe (FR, DE, SE, DK, NL, CH, IT)

RRT FR attended events for the disability sector including La Nuit de l'Innovation Solidaire and Pyramide des Chasseurs, both Handicap International events aimed at supporting the disabled and the vulnerable.

RRT FR also partnered with different charities to help raise money for cancer, including a race in La Defense Paris, Les Guerrières in Alès, and Une Rose Un Espoir.

RRT DE volunteers in Siegen were delighted to support the Lukas Brado Friendly Cup along with sponsors, FC Dautenbach. Funds raised on the day went to purchase a wheelchair-accessible car.

When Gummersbach celebrated its 25th anniversary, RRT DE volunteers showed their appreciation for hospital staff. Other hospitals RRT DE supported

included GFO Kliniken Mettmann, GFO Kliniken Langenfeld and GFO Kliniken Hilden.

While in Sweden, **RRT SE** provided meals to participants of Barncancerfonden (Walk of Hope), a nationwide event that raises money for childhood cancer research and prevention.

RRT CH also supported hospital staff and patients on Future Day in Stadtspital Zürich donating RRT Snack Packs.

RRT NL was delighted to participate in International Nurses Day along with our EU counterparts to recognise frontline workers as well as participate in the Team Rynkeby's Tour to Paris.

Argentina

As part of recognising our hard-working medical and hospital staff, **RRT ARG** was delighted to participate in the global International Nurses Day campaign. All three localities participated, which included Bahía Blanca, Buenos Aires and Rosario.

New Zealand

We continued to support a diverse range of charities assisting people experiencing housing insecurity and financial hardship. Highlights included participating in the Kid's Big Day Out, and events with Legacy and Te Rauiri, supporting disadvantaged families.

We also provided Care Kits and Fresh Start Kits to help build self-esteem among school-aged children. Blankets and other warm items were also donated to a range of charities including Te Whare Korowai Taangata o

Kirikiroa, a men's homeless shelter, and Jammies 4 June, both of which help make winter more comfortable for those in need.

Our partnership with New Zealand Police continued, enabling us to regularly distribute our Food Boxes within our communities. Through the Season of Giving campaign we were able to donate 774 Holiday Food Boxes, providing over 18,500 meals to those in need.

Australia

RRT AU volunteers were on site well before sunrise cooking breakfast and brewing coffee to support 11 different CEO Sleepout in collaboration with Vinnies in an effort to end the cycle of homelessness. Hundreds of CEO's and senior managers spent a night sleeping rough with nothing but a piece of cardboard and a few warm clothes.

Other events included our ongoing support of Keep the Faith, Feed the Homeless, and providing regular BBQ meals for those experiencing housing insecurity.

Our collaboration with Brisbane City Council in delivering the Homeless Connect event also continued.

Our RRT Food Boxes, distributed via various charities, is one of the core ways we support those experiencing hardship. Our volunteers provide these donations to neighbourhood centres, schools and church charities who distribute these on our behalf to those in need.

United Kingdom

Similarly to RRT AU, a highlight in the homelessness focus area was RRT UK's support of the CEO Sleepouts events. Our volunteers provided a warm, hearty breakfast in the morning which was a welcome relief after sleeping out in the coldest month of the year.

RRT UK also supported Turning Tides, a West Sussex charity tackling homelessness. This is just one of the 85 events we assisted with this year as part of our commitment to helping those charities focused on addressing this issue.

North America + Caribbean

Supporting many other charities including Covenant House, Ronald McDonald House and others, RRT in North America and the Caribbean provided hot meals, Food Boxes, water and refreshments to those in need.

Europe (FR, DE, SE, DK, NL, CH, IT)

RRT FR supported Restos du Coeur again across two locations and also assisted The Race Against Hunger event, providing sustenance to Parisian participants.

RRT DE were delighted to donate 450 RRT Care Kits to different charities throughout the year including SkF e.V. Langenfeld and Solingen's Women's Shelter.

In its fourth year, RRT DE supported Caritas Oberberg with donations of RRT Food Boxes. Caritas is a charity that works to help their local community's most vulnerable.

RRT DE's support of the Tafel organisation continued, supplying hot meals to various food bank events throughout the year including Leichlingen, Siegen and Gummersbach.

RRT SE delivered 115 Christmas packs to families of inmates in Kristianstad, Jönköping and Nyköping in collaboration with charity One Step, with the aim of strengthening family bonds.

Partnering with Raddningsmissinen (Rescue Mission), a charity focused on combating social vulnerability in Gothenburg, RRT SE supported an event for 300 Ukrainian refugees to receive donations of food and clothing.

In another initiative, RRT SE donated Food Boxes to the Berga Parish to extend the support they provide to families in need in the area, as well as hygiene kits to St. Clara Church in Stockholm, who assist those facing financial hardship and homelessness. Other organisations RRT SE collaborated with included

Women's Shelter Maria by providing hygiene kits, RRT Snack Packs and plush Cookie mascots for their kids.

RRT DK volunteers from One School Global's Copenhagen Campus spent time over their school holidays to pack RRT Food Boxes which were then distributed to partner charities to be given to those in need.

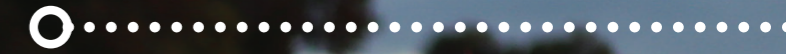
RRT DK volunteers were also on hand to feed 500 visitors to Gentofte Fire Station at their annual Red Cross Christmas Aid event which helped to raise DKK10,000.

Argentina

RRT ARG continued its support of Fundación Llegando a Vos with RRT Food Boxes and other essentials. The charity supports over 80 families, focusing on empowering underprivileged women and children by providing guidance on health, parenting and life skills. Additionally, it assists early childhood development through the nutritional recovery programs for children up to 5 years of age.

2024 got off to a quick start, when severe storms hit South-East Queensland. More than 50 local and interstate volunteers came together to assist in the recovery operation. The efforts of the Australian Defence Force, Rural Fire Service, and Disaster Relief Australia to remove 3,000 cubic tonnes of debris left in the wake of the storms were enhanced not only by the physical labour provided by RRT, but also by heavy machinery, such as bobcats and excavators, generously provided by local Community businesses. While many volunteers were directly involved in the clean-up effort, others worked tirelessly behind the scenes, firing up our BBQ trailers to supply fresh meals to frontline workers.

One of RRT's strengths is not just the speed of our response but also the diverse ways in which we can assist. In the aftermath of natural disasters, there is often an initial surge of attention and aid. However, when the focus shifts elsewhere, communities are often left to navigate a long road to recovery alone. When we learned about the Gold Coast City Council's Disaster Recovery Grant Program, we saw an opportunity to extend our support five months later by providing 200 Food Boxes to several local charities.

In other emergency and disaster responses, December saw a wave of bushfires once again impacting Victoria's Grampians region. Our volunteers from Sunbury, Melton, and Stawell stepped up to assist, while volunteers in Adelaide, Bathurst, and Lithgow ensured firefighters attending fires over the Christmas period received essential catering support.

RRT's Ignite Conference, held at the end of 2023, brought together all our Regional and Local Team Leaders for a national think tank. This event provided a critical platform to refine our operational strategy and set clear expectations for our leadership teams. The insights we gained from the event helped identify ways to enhance efficiency and how we might expand our impact. In 2025, we will continue to refine our processes while addressing feedback obtained from our first Volunteer Survey.

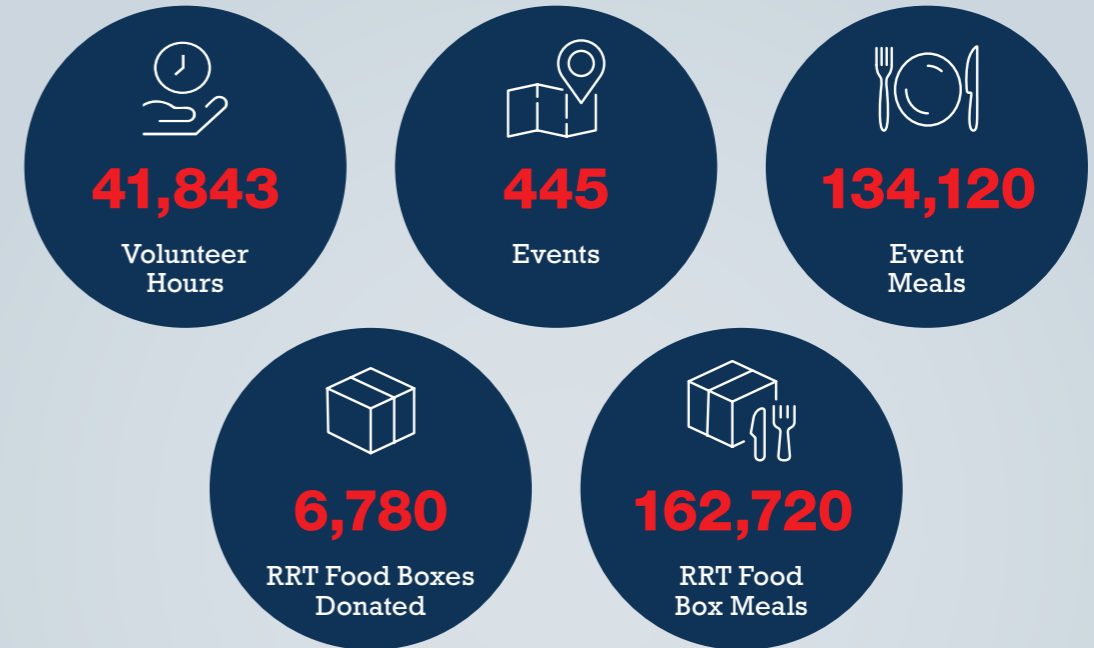
One of the key successes of our participation in RRT's first global campaign for International Nurses Day was the inspiration it sparked within our teams. Several localities that had not previously participated seized the opportunity to engage with new beneficiaries. There was overwhelmingly positive feedback from both volunteers and beneficiaries on the value an appreciation event brings. Ultimately, engaging in collaborative action ensures that we align our global vision with tangible local impact.

We also continued to strengthen our relationships with various emergency service agencies through a range of training exercises, wellbeing days, flood rescues, and appreciation events. All of these interactions serve as touchpoints to build trust, enhance understanding of how RRT works, and showcase the full scope of our capabilities.

The team also took great satisfaction in providing much-needed aid to drought-stricken farmers in the Murraylands region of South Australia. After a prolonged absence of rainfall, which imposed both financial and emotional strain on the community, we organised a donation of livestock feed through one of our Farmers Community Connect (FCC) events. While this was a small gesture of relief, our goal was to build on previous charitable efforts and continue elevating awareness of the issue to state government level. Shortly after our event, the South Australian government officially declared the drought and announced an \$18 million support package. Our FCC events not only provide direct support to rural communities but also foster connections with neighbours and local support services, ensuring those facing hardship know they are not alone.

Finally, our achievements are only made possible by the unwavering dedication of our volunteers. Their commitment to giving back to their local communities - identifying and addressing need - is an inspiration to our operational support team and beneficiaries alike. 2025 will see us continue to strive to make a meaningful difference, engage with our beneficiaries and ensure their positive stories are shared.

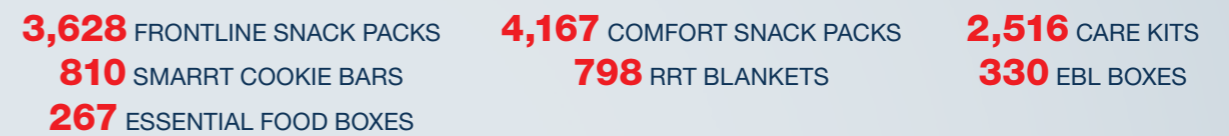

Major Initiative

RRT AU Supports South Australia's Drought Stricken Farmers

According to rainfall data from Australia's Bureau of Meteorology, 2024 was one of the driest years on record in the Murraylands region of South Australia, dating back to 1900.

The prolonged absence of rainfall has had widespread impacts, including below-average crop yields, reducing the availability of feed for livestock.

As a result, many farmers face difficult choices, such as purchasing expensive feed or selling off their livestock, both of which impose significant financial and emotional strain.

In response, RRT AU spoke with Simone Bailey, Mayor of Mid Murray Council, to organise a Farmers Community Connect (FCC) event to support local farmers.

In preparation for the event, 250 one-tonne bulka bags were filled with fibre and grain rich pellets, feed that can be used to supplement livestock diet during drought, or when pasture quality is poor, or scarce.

Ten semi-trailers arrived at a warehouse in Young, NSW to load the feed. The semis then set off, accompanied by another semi full of RRT equipment, commencing the 1,000 km journey to Mannum, a small town located in the heart of the Murraylands, where the FCC event was to be held.

As Michael Dunn, RRT AU Operations Manager said, "While we know that we cannot fix the drought, we do know that this small contribution does provide some

relief, both financially and mentally. Our FCC events are designed to get farmers off the land and give them an opportunity to connect with their community."

In all, about 35 volunteers from Brisbane, Sydney, Goulburn and Adelaide supported the delivery of the event. All hands were on deck to help welcome farmers, load trailers with pellets, make barista coffees, or cook and serve delicious hot bacon and egg rolls or our Signature Burgers.

"We're all in awe of the resilience of our farmers but this drought is more severe than many people realise," Michael said.

Local farmer Stephen Crane said, "Farming is by nature isolating, and you can get stuck in a bit of self-pity. You don't stop to think that there are others in the same situation as you. This event not only showed us that we are not alone, but there is a community out there who cares."

In total 169 farmers registered for the event to receive the 250 bags of feed, which was estimated to support 166,000 sheep and 4,450 head of cattle.

The 450 coffees, 600 bottles of water, 500 bacon and egg rolls and burgers, complimented by plenty of Krispy Kreme donuts, were all a huge hit.

Mannum was RRT AU's 32nd FCC event. The concept was created in 2018 and since then, RRT has supported around 5,500 farmers impacted by fire, flood or drought.

Beneficiary Highlights

In 2024, we saw a tremendous effort, resulting in a 48% increase in beneficiary touch points from 603 to 890.

Our collaboration with emergency services extended to 15 different Country Fire Associations including the Horsham Incident Control Centre, Forest Fire Management, and the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action. Through our response to the South-East Queensland storm recovery, we were able to reconnect with Recovery Australia and the Australian Defence force.

The majority of these events were supporting fire or emergency responses but also included assistance in delivering training days and appreciation events. Notably, our strong connection with the CFA and the SES remains particularly rewarding, given their not-for-profit status and voluntary structure.

We frequently work with local councils to facilitate events that raise awareness of health issues, support fundraisers, and provide donations to relevant charities. Just a few of the councils we solidified relationships with included Brisbane, Armidale, Campbelltown, Gympie, Wagga Wagga, Leeton, and Hepburn.

A key feature of our event calendar was our appreciation events, which provided volunteers the opportunity to express gratitude to those working on the frontlines of our communities. Of particular note was International Nurses Day, when 340 volunteers served 9,400 meals

across 26 events throughout the eastern states. Participating hospitals included Cambridge Hospital, Hobart, Dhelkaya Health, Castlemaine, Lachlan Health Services, Parkes, and Hervey Bay Hospital.

Our multi-day, multi-region events create a chance for RRT to support large-scale activities, assisting organisers with seamless logistics, particularly around catering. Regular events on our calendar include Pollicy Pedal, R U Ok? Day, and Vinnie's CEO Sleepout.

We continued to work with charities and organisations whose efforts are focused on the care of vulnerable children. Our association with organisations and events such as NSW's Boys to the Bush, Melbourne's Good Friday Appeal, Kalamunda's Kalability program, Mission Australia's Child Protection Week, Create Foundation, Convoy for Kids in Brisbane and Goulburn, and of course the Special Children's Christmas Parties continued.

Aside from events, there are a vast number of donations that go out to a variety of organisations that support those experiencing financial stress or housing insecurity. Recipients included schools such as Dalwallinu District High, charities such as Catholic Care, or Evolve Housing as well as refuge centres like the Domestic Violence Action Centres, Corrective Services.

We look forward to continuing to support our long-time collaborators as well as exploring new opportunities with new partners in 2025.

This year has been another incredible one for RRT NZ, filled with impactful moments and steady progress.

The year began with multiple reactive fire events in Canterbury, which required significant effort and coordination. These incidents extended into September and December, showcasing the ongoing need for RRT’s support in times of crisis.

Throughout 2024, we maintained steady engagement with various government agencies, particularly the police, through our Food Box program. National Emergency Management (NEMA & CDEM) also kept us busy, as we participated in numerous joint planning events to ensure improved preparedness for major disasters. Strengthening these partnerships remains a priority, as it enhances our ability to respond effectively when needed.

International Nurses Day was a roaring success this year, with RRT NZ teams in 22 localities serving a remarkable 19,840 meals to the nursing community. The positive feedback was overwhelming and heartwarming. One nurse expressed, “No one thinks of us, but you people have,” while another shared, “It’s amazing to feel so appreciated.” These moments reaffirm the importance of our efforts in recognising and supporting essential workers.

On the subject of healthcare, one of the year’s standout achievements was RRT’s sponsorship of the Taranaki Health Foundation Intensive Care Unit to the value of NZ\$1.5 million. In recognition of this donation, the unit will be officially named the Rapid Relief Team ICU. This partnership demonstrates RRT NZ’s ongoing commitment to supporting critical health services. The appreciation from the Taranaki Health Foundation team was profound, and it was fitting that the handover coincided with one of our International Nurses Day events, where 40 volunteers served 1,800 meals.

Following the success of the Farmer’s Community Connect events in 2023, RRT NZ was delighted to support another event in collaboration with Federated Farmers, who sought our assistance for their event in Gisborne. Together, we provided farmers with essential fencing packs to aid in their ongoing recovery after Cyclone Gabrielle. The day was a tremendous success, showcasing the remarkable teamwork of our volunteers and leaving recipients with an unforgettable experience that underscored the value of these initiatives.

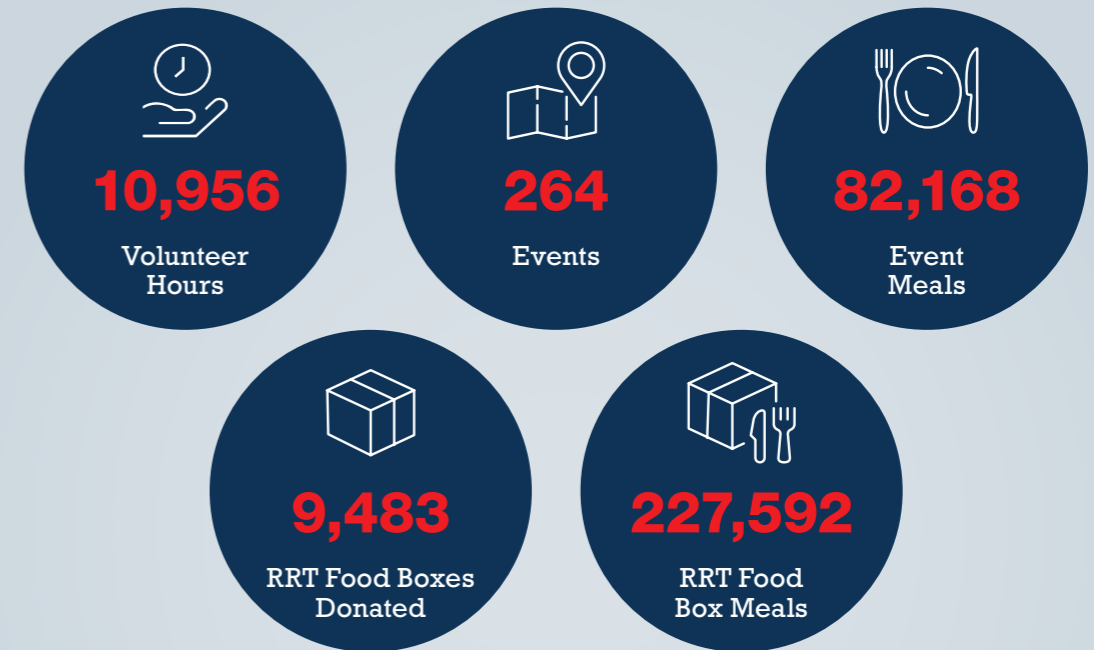

A Collaborative Effort Delivers \$1.5 Million for Taranaki Base Hospital Upgrade

In a major initiative, RRT NZ contributed NZ\$1.5 million toward a significant upgrade of Taranaki Base Hospital. This remarkable achievement was made possible through a collaborative donation pool, supported by RRT Taranaki volunteers and funded by local Community members. Notably, 16 businesses and individuals, including RRT NZ, contributed over \$20,000 each to the project.

The donation is a major contribution toward the fit-out of the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) in the hospital's new East Wing Building, currently under construction. In recognition of this effort, the ICU will officially be named the 'Rapid Relief Team ICU'.

The donation, made to the Taranaki Health Foundation (THF), will help deliver a state-of-the-art ICU, due to be opened in the third quarter of 2025. The new facility will provide cutting-edge care for the growing Taranaki community, ensuring the hospital is equipped to meet both current and future needs. With separate rooms for each patient and modern medical infrastructure, the ICU will dramatically improve critical care services.

Health New Zealand / Te Whatu Ora Group Director of Operations in Taranaki, Gillian Campbell, noted the

upgrade has helped us add to our new build, giving our staff and communities an outstanding ICU facility for a community the size of Taranaki.

The funding will deliver an ICU that has separate rooms for each patient, providing an enhanced level of care that everyone in the community deserves.

Currently, the nearest ICU ward is 70 kms away, south of New Plymouth. The addition of this new facility ensures local residents will no longer need to travel long distances during emergencies or post-operative care.

When complete, the six-storey building will house a new emergency department, maternity, primary birthing, neonatal unit, radiology, laboratory, a roof-top helipad in addition to the ICU unit. It's also being built to an Importance Level 4 building meaning it will withstand natural disasters like a volcano eruption or major earthquake.

The success of this initiative highlights the power of community collaboration. By working together, Taranaki businesses and RRT volunteers have delivered a legacy that will benefit the region for years to come.

Beneficiary Highlights

In 2024, RRT NZ supported 315 different government agencies, charities, schools and other organisations. This included working with emergency services such as Fire & Emergency New Zealand, Land Search & Rescue, New Zealand Civil Defence, Canterbury West Coast Air Rescue, and New Zealand Response Teams. Our teams kept first responders fuelled and energised during emergencies, training exercises or preparedness events.

We were delighted to extend our support of Gisborne farmers through a new collaboration. Delivering our sixth Farmers Community Connect Event, we partnered with Federated Farmers to donate 49,000 fence posts and 70 tonnes of battens and wire to 240 recipients. Nearly two years on, this community is still working to recover from devastating impact of Cyclone Gabrielle.

To bring moments of joy to facing financial hardship or living with disabilities, we supported a range of organisations, including Enabling Good Lives Mid Central, Special Children's Christmas Parties, CCS Disability Action, the ParaFed Network and Wheelchair Basketball New Zealand. These events aim to foster community connection, build confidence and promote inclusiveness regardless of circumstance.

At select events, RRT NZ was delighted to raise funds through meal sales. RRT donated all the meals, with proceeds returned to event organisers to support

their cause. Notable collaborations included fundraising for the Starship Foundation, Cure Kids, and Little Elms Charitable Trust's Ride in a Truck Day, and Hospice Marlborough.

Supporting charitable events that aid individuals and families facing health challenges, such as cancer, is a regular feature on our calendar. In 2024, we partnered with organisations including Relay for Life, the Acorn Project, and the Cancer Society. It was a special delight to once again support St John Ambulance New Zealand in their Trash & Treasure event, their largest annual fundraising day.

RRT also delivered a wide range of essential products to meet the diverse needs of beneficiaries. Food Boxes were provided to organisations such as Ronald McDonald House, Loving Arms and Taranaki Women's Refuge, offering temporary relief from food insecurity. Fresh Start and Care Kits reached local schools including St James Christchurch, Motueka High School, and Chertsey School, and extended as far as the Fiji Mission.

Additionally, in partnership with New Zealand Police, we supplied essential items via their Violent Victim Support division. We also continued to work directly with Woman's Refuge, and Loloma Home & Care Centre to provide temporary relief to women in need.

2024 has been a year of impactful initiatives and dedicated support from RRT UK volunteers. Through collaboration with key partners and the dedication of our teams, efforts have focused on addressing urgent needs across various sectors.

One of the most significant events of the year was the response to a mass stabbing incident that occurred in Southport, Merseyside. The tragedy had nationwide repercussions, as tensions rose across several cities, emergency services were required to work extended hours to maintain public safety. In response, RRT UK provide meals and refreshments to these responders.

RRT UK continued its partnership with SaveUA, a registered charity in Ukraine, to deliver aid to those on the frontlines of the war. An unprecedented 4.5 million RRT Food Boxes meals were packed and distributed to displaced individuals. This initiative not only provided essential aid but created job opportunities for refugees who fled to western Ukraine. Additionally, the program supported local suppliers and farmers, positively contributing to the country's economy.

2024 also saw the expansion of our asset base with the introduction of a new van designed for rapid deployment. Fully equipped with a barista-grade coffee machine, it has been used nationwide at various emergency response efforts and community initiatives. This resource has also played a key role in our Construction Community Connect (C3) initiative, which assists in raising awareness about mental health in the construction industry. With high suicide rates in the sector, programs like C3 have been instrumental in

encouraging open discussions, contributing to lifesaving prevention and intervention efforts. RRT UK was present at major construction sites including Hinkley Point C, a nuclear power station being built in Somerset, and HS2, the high-speed railway project between London and Birmingham.

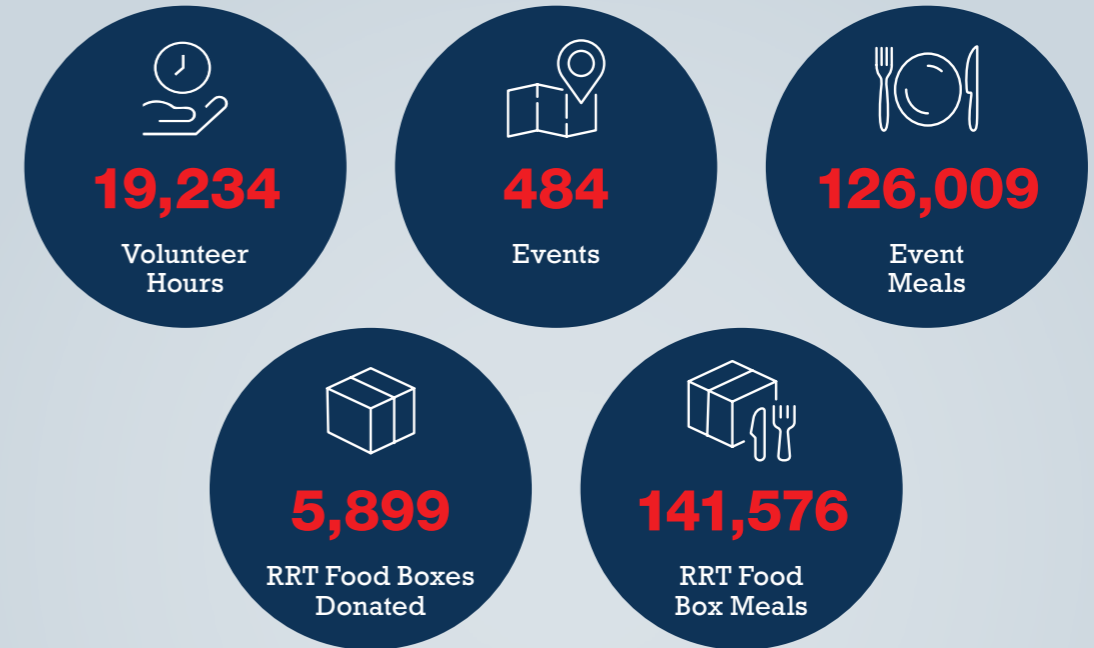
To further enhance support at events, we introduced a fleet of bean-to-cup coffee machines. These machines ensure that emergency personnel and the communities we serve receive high-quality refreshments, particularly at reactive events. The deployment of these machines has strengthened RRT UK's ability to provide effective service in critical situations.

One of the most unique scenarios of the year was the discovery of a WWII bomb in Plymouth. Emergency teams carried out a prolonged, complex, and exhausting disposal. RRT UK supplied meals and refreshments to sustain the teams throughout the operation.

The dedication of our volunteers was recognised with a Highly Commended Award at the Charity Awards Today and an acknowledgment from Plymouth Police. Recognition was received for contributions made throughout the year. These moments highlight the impact our volunteers make in assisting communities and emergency services in times of need.

Looking ahead to 2025, our focus remains on expanding capabilities, strengthening partnerships, and ensuring a swift response to emerging needs. The Rapid Relief Team's continued dedication to these goals will ensure meaningful support reaches those who need it most.

SaveUA supporting Ukraine through Operation 322

When war erupted in Ukraine in 2022, millions of lives were thrown into turmoil. The simple act of putting food on the table became an overwhelming challenge. In response, RRT launched Operation 322 just days after the war began—an initiative designed to bring hope and relief through humanitarian aid.

A year into the conflict, RRT partnered with SaveUA, a Ukraine-based charity, to deliver essential supplies such as Food Boxes, water, Smarrt Cookie Bars, Bibles, and Care Kits to displaced families and vulnerable individuals across eastern Ukraine. What began as an emergency relief effort has since grown into a lifeline for millions.

So far, over 552,700 Food Boxes have been distributed, equivalent to a total of 14.5 million meals. These supplies have reached 2.3 million families, providing not just nourishment, but also a sense of stability and hope amid great uncertainty.

As 2024 unfolded, the impact of this mission became even clearer. Feedback from SaveUA and recipients has underscored just how vital these Food Boxes have been in easing unimaginable hardship. For many, these deliveries represent more than just meals; they are a reminder that they are not alone.

RRT's collaboration with SaveUA has enabled a scalable and adaptable response, ensuring aid continues as conditions on the ground evolve. Beyond providing direct relief, the partnership with SaveUA ensures food is sourced locally from Ukrainian farmers and producers, while displaced individuals are employed to pack and distribute Food Boxes. This not only creates a sustainable aid delivery model, but also supports the local economy, offering stability to those affected by the crisis.

At its heart, Operation 322 is a testament to the power of our donors' support and partnerships like SaveUA. As the situation continues, RRT remains committed to delivering relief.

In 2024, RRT UK had the privilege of supporting a wide range of beneficiaries across our four key areas of focus. We worked with over 481 organisations, providing aid through events and product donations.

In emergency and disaster relief, we partnered with Fire and Rescue services across Kent, Norfolk, Hampshire, Surrey, and Bedfordshire, delivering meals and support to both firefighters and communities impacted by fires, floods, and other disasters.

Our work with organisations like The Spires Centre, CEO Sleepout, YMCA, and Stonepillow allowed us to provide meals and essential items to individuals facing homelessness and poverty, making a direct difference in their lives.

Through our youth-focused partnerships with charities like Kids Inspire, Marie Curie, Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity, Foyle Down Syndrome Trust, and Zoë's Place Baby Hospice, we help empower young people to overcome challenges and build resilience.

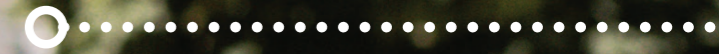
In the health and disability sector, we collaborated with a wide variety of NHS hospitals nationally, as well as the British Heart Foundation, Rowcroft Hospice, Macmillan Cancer Support, and Kilbryde Hospice, supporting those affected by serious health issues.

By the close of 2024, our UK volunteers had donated over 19,000 hours, a testament to living our values of serving people and communities in need with care and compassion.

As I conclude my first year leading RRT EU, I am delighted to report on a record year in the delivery of our red tent events. Our teams are spread across their individual countries, some more sparsely than others, and vary in size in terms of their volunteer base. However, our connection to our global RRT colleagues has provided the support and inspiration for us to make a significant impact in each of our locations in 2024.

Our focus for the last 12 months has been to increase our connectivity to the communities where we live and work, ensuring we are giving back to those in need in a meaningful way. This has seen us rebalance our activities from donations to proactive events. With more activity within our communities, our beneficiaries interacted with our volunteers, improving their understanding of our capability, but more importantly, our purpose and who we are.

Some of the highlights for 2024 include our first multi-country support of the Team Rynkeby event in our largest collaborative effort to date. RRT EU volunteers from Germany, Sweden, The Netherlands and France manned pitstops for many of the 2,000 cycling participants serving 2,000 meals, 3,000 bottles of water and 500 coffees in Malmo, Siegen, Belgium and Paris.

When a fire broke out in the Massif des Maures in the south of France in June, RRT FR was called on to support 800 firefighters battling the blaze. The fire burned relentlessly for three days and saw 10,000 people evacuated. 40 RRT FR volunteers were onsite and served 1,500 meals over consecutive days.

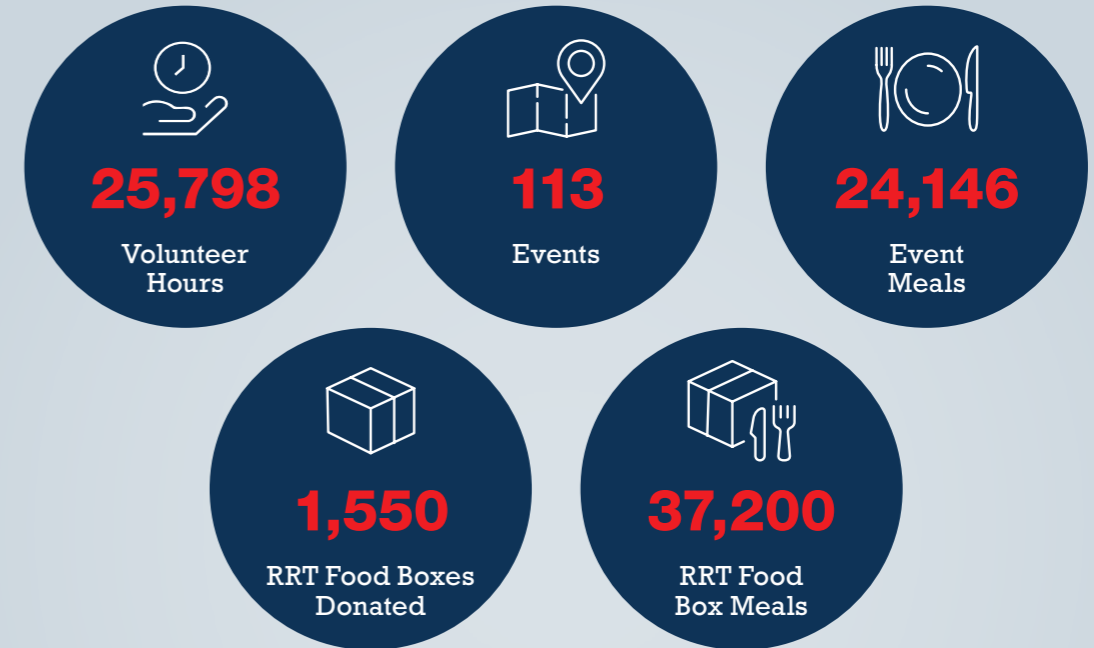
RRT EU also participated in RRT's first global campaign to recognise International Nurses Day. Sweden and France contributed to the RRT EU effort, with Germany delivering its first ever hospital appreciation events, successfully organising three events to recognise and thank local hospital staff.

Our volunteers in Denmark increased their reach, supporting local fire stations in delivering six different Red Tent events, often helping raise funds for local charities. Meanwhile, Sweden continued to strengthen and build on its Prison Christmas Pack program in collaboration with One Step, to help those incarcerated connect with their families.

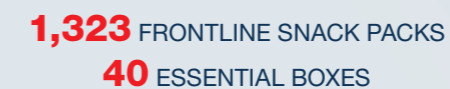
Looking forward, 2025 is set to be another exciting year that will build and expand our reach. Our involvement in the Team Rynkeby event will see our logistical support expand from four countries to seven, and four locations to 11. Our volunteer base supporting this event will also grow to incorporate those from Switzerland and Denmark. We also look forward to increasing our involvement in recognising International Nurses Day and finalising details for Switzerland and Italy to become official RRT entities.

2024 has been an exceptional year of learning and growth for the European teams, igniting a new level of enthusiasm among our volunteers. I am grateful for the energy, ideas and willingness that everyone brings to the table. To you all, I thank you for your time, care and compassion. I look forward to working with you all on creating new opportunities to create impact and give back in 2025.

Beneficiary Spotlight

RRT EU supported Team Rynkeby in their largest collaborative effort to date

For four years, volunteers from across Europe have supported Team Rynkeby's Tour de Paris in various forms. However, 2024 saw RRT's largest collaborative effort yet.

The Team Rynkeby event sees over 2,000 participants divided into 64 teams, who ride 1,300 kms, starting in Denmark and finishing in Paris. The race spans seven stages, over a period of seven to ten days, traversing eight countries. Teams ride various stages with the shortest stage being around 100 kms and the longest 200 kms.

The idea originated from an employee of a leading Danish juice company, Rynkeby Foods A/S. The employee, Knud Vilstrup, was diagnosed with lung cancer, motivating him to lead a healthier life. At a Christmas party, Knud Vilstrup floated the idea of a ride to Paris, that would require physical training but would also create an interesting experience. The first ride, saw 11 cyclists and 1 volunteer make the journey from Ringe in Denmark to Paris in 2002 as Team Rynkeby.

Their effort raised almost AU\$8,000, which was subsequently donated to a local children's cancer unit. Vilstrup saw the opportunity and persuaded the company's CEO to invest in the project, creating the charity that it is today. In 2023, total funds raised exceeded AU\$15 million. The money is donated to help children with critical illnesses in Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Norway, the Faeroe Islands, Iceland, Germany and Switzerland.

100 volunteers from Germany, Sweden, The Netherlands and France were out in force across four different locations including Malmo, Siegen, Belgium and Paris, greeting cyclists with hot food

and refreshments, providing them with much needed energy to continue their stage. Over the four locations RRT EU volunteers served 2,000 meals, 3,000 bottles of water, and 500 coffees.

Participants not only have distance to contend with, but battle steep inclines, poor weather, and general fatigue. The relief and gratitude to be provided with one of RRT's hot meals and barista coffee was clearly evident. As one rider remarked. "... we were greeted by the Rapid Relief Team and the scent of their fantastic burgers. We're starving and tired, but these burgers made up for it."

The support RRT provided was greatly appreciated, so 2025 will see us expand our involvement as a Platinum level sponsor. This will see us ramp up our logistical support expanding from four to seven countries. Additional volunteers will be recruited from Switzerland and Denmark to ensure the event's smooth delivery.

Our participation in the event in 2024 was excellent practice, with an anticipated increase of 350% in the number of meals served, targeting 9,500.

It is an event that presents logistical challenges and requires careful planning, but it unites our Europe teams in a common purpose, creating unique opportunities to grow our expertise.

This charitable event is truly remarkable, with the participants creating an infectious, positive spirit. The physical challenges they face are astounding. It is humbling to play a part in underpinning the achievement of their goals of completing the race, but also their fund raising, which will help those children who are desperately ill.

2024 was a year of growth, strengthened beneficiary relationships, expanded capabilities, and a deepened presence within the emergency and disaster relief sector.

One of the most significant events of the year was our response to a major bushfire in Vidauban, Southern France, where RRT FR played a crucial role in supporting emergency services. Our reactive response not only provided immediate relief to emergency services crews but also highlighted RRT FR's capabilities to local authorities. Importantly, this effort has strengthened ties with the fire department in Southern France, reinforcing our ability to provide rapid response within a two-hour radius of our localities. The appreciation for our assistance in this crisis has positioned RRT FR as a potential first point of contact for future emergency and disaster relief efforts.

Further solidifying our presence within the emergency services community, RRT FR participated in the Congress of Firefighters for the first time. This event provided a valuable opportunity to establish relationships, showcase the RRT brand, and demonstrate our capabilities as a trusted partner. Encouragingly, organisers have already expressed interest in RRT FR participating in future congresses, further embedding us within a network of first responders and expanding our ability to make a positive impact when needed.

We also took part in the global campaign recognising medical and nursing staff on International Nurses Day, which was a great success from the perspective of both

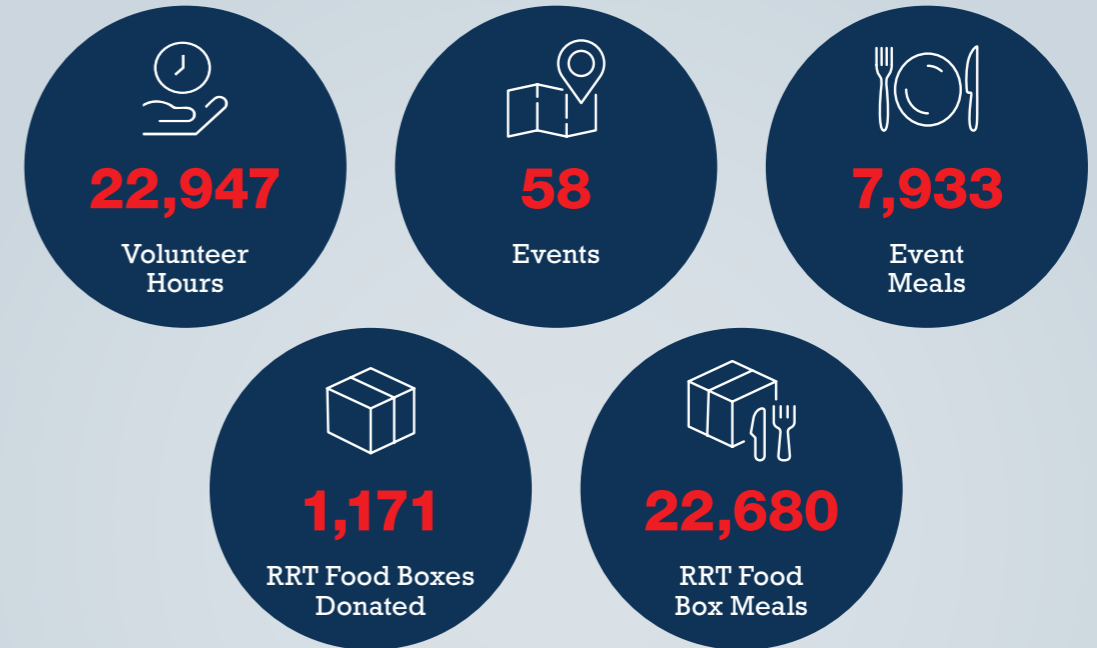
recipients and volunteers. Looking ahead to the 2025 campaign, we will aim to engage our teams early to ensure thorough planning, with the goal of delivering events in at least three major cities.

Our operational capabilities expanded considerably with the introduction of two new BBQ trailers, significantly enhancing our ability to provide emergency support as well as extend our proactive event reach. In 2025, we aim to expand our resources further by adding at least two RRT Coffee Trailers to our asset register. This will bolster our response capabilities as well our ability to serve a broader range of beneficiaries through more Red Tent events.

Building on the momentum of 2024, RRT FR has set some ambitious objectives for the year ahead. Our key priorities include strengthening our communication across local teams to increase volunteer engagement, establishing RRT FR as a key partner for emergency services by building on the connections made to date, and expanding our volunteer base to support more communities in need.

RRT FR remains committed to making a tangible impact and growing our ability to serve those in need. With a larger volunteer base, new assets and greater collaboration with emergency services, we are well positioned to build on the progress we have made to date and continue delivering hope and relief to communities across the country.

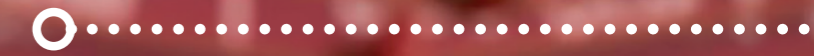

2024 has been a year of insights and growth for RRT DE. This growth included a marked increase in the number of events delivered, the number of volunteers, and a new understanding of what the possibilities are for our team. Reflecting on the past year, two factors for success have been collaboration and strategic focus.

One of the collaborative highlights was working with our counterparts, RRT SE, RRT FR, and RRT NL, on the Team Rynkeby event. Not only was it a rewarding experience for our volunteers, but it also provided excellent learning opportunities. This was the first time our volunteers have had the opportunity to work on an event of this scale, gaining valuable insights into effective event processes and logistics.

From a strategic perspective, participating in this event broadened our vision of what is possible for RRT in Germany. With this in mind, we are already in talks with one organisation to support the delivery of an event in Germany, similar in nature to Team Rynkeby, albeit on a smaller scale.

The strategic focus that our Global Strive provides has given our team greater accountability, clarity of purpose, and ensured our volunteers remain actively engaged. Being globally connected has helped us think

differently and how to create effective impact locally.

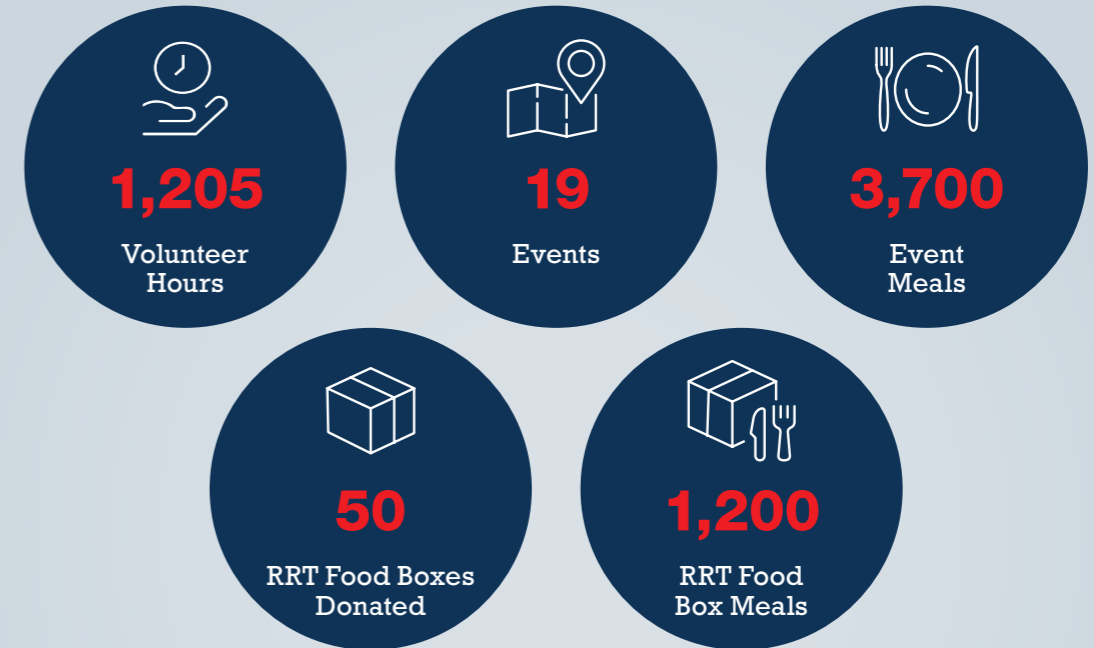
This was evident in our participation in RRT's International Nurses Day campaign. Taking part in this campaign helped us approach hospitals and successfully engage them to deliver our first appreciation events in the health sector. The feedback from both our beneficiaries and our volunteers was so positive that we plan to expand the number of hospitals we support in 2025.

While last year was a year of new horizons, we also strengthened our support within our existing network. For the Langenfeld Volunteer Fire Brigade, we were delighted to donate three, state of the art, battery-powered spotlights. These lights will be used by units in Richrath, Wiescheid, and Reusrath providing a portable and compact lighting solution to enhance conditions when working under pressure. We also continued our collaboration with the Tafel organisation, which does such an incredible work providing food assistance to so many across Germany.

There is no doubt RRT DE has a renewed energy, with our team eager to build on our experiences. Our goal for 2025 is to continue thinking differently, remain open to new opportunities, and stay focused on creating meaningful impact.

With a clear vision, supported by our dedicated volunteers, I am confident that the year ahead will bring more positive impact for those in need.

Challenge and opportunity are two words that could be used to describe 2024, which saw the most disasters supported in RRT's history. Despite repeated calls to many localities, our volunteers continued to willingly step up to provide care and compassionate support.

Early in the year, our teams responded to the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge in Baltimore. Within two hours of the Dali, a Singaporean container ship, striking the bridge's pylon, our volunteers were on the frontlines. By the end of the first day, volunteers from Baltimore and Washington had served 1,300 meals, supporting 16 different agencies involved in the operation.

Weeks later, 120 volunteers from Iowa, Nebraska, and Minnesota provided aid to communities affected by a series of Midwest tornadoes. The most significant damage was in Minden, Iowa, where Pottawattamie County Emergency Management Department appointed RRT NA as the sole provider of meals during the recovery effort. As always, Community spirit is boundless, and we were grateful for the generous equipment donations from local businesses, enabling volunteers to navigate debris and access people in need. Over eight days, RRT NA served more than 5,500 meals.

In July, Hurricane Beryl brought further devastation when it made landfall in Texas. RRT volunteers quickly deployed to Sargent, distributing warm meals and Food Boxes to emergency services crews and affected residents. In October, we responded again when Hurricane Helene struck North Carolina and Eastern Tennessee. Volunteers initially provided Frontline Snack Packs, bottled water, bales of toilet paper, and other

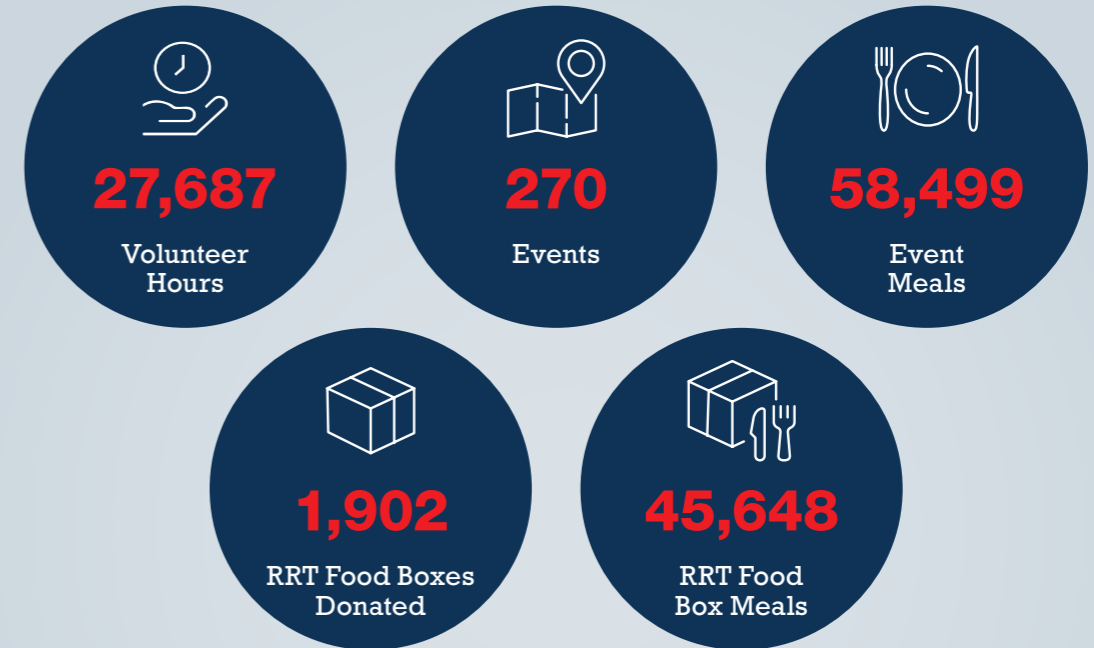
essentials. Donations were made to Buncombe County Sheriff's Office and directly to emergency responders. Our support for Helene's victims continued throughout the year, including food, clothing, generators, RRT Care Kits, and blankets as the winter approached. Assistance will continue into 2025 as required.

Beyond disaster relief, our volunteers supported an array of charitable initiatives. Some highlights included two fundraising events for the Alzheimer's Association, assisting Faith & Blue in their efforts to foster inclusive communities, as delivering multiple events for healthcare workers, including Unity Hospital in Rochester, PAM Health Specialty Hospital of Stoughton, and Mount Carmel in Franklinton. We also collaborated with St. Jude's Cancer Research Hospital on four fun-run fundraiser events. Meanwhile, in Canada, we assisted frontline workers in Redwood Falls, Winnipeg, and Perth during training and community days.

Looking ahead, RRT NA plans to expand our participation in International Nurses Day, enhance volunteers training, and grow our volunteer base to increase our reach and impact.

Taking on the role of Operations Manager in June left little time for adjustment, but having been a volunteer since 2016, I was well acquainted with RRT's operations. Witnessing our volunteers' responsiveness and enthusiasm firsthand has been a privilege. Their unwavering commitment to serving first responders and communities in times of crisis and need has been nothing short of inspiring.

Delivering Essential Aid in the Wake of Hurricane Helene

In less than two days, an area of scattered thunderstorms and rain in the western Caribbean Sea rapidly intensified into a Category 4 hurricane. Helene travelled northeast, leaving a swath of destruction across Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, and North Carolina. Hurricane-force winds and rainfall triggered catastrophic flooding. Helene became one of the deadliest storms, claiming 230 lives, with costs estimated as high as US\$200 billion.

As residents of Cocke County took stock of flood damage caused by record-breaking, 500-year rainfall, 34 volunteers from five surrounding localities set up in Erwin. Over two days, they served 1,000 hot meals to residents and 600 emergency workers from a dozen agencies. The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, local sheriff's departments, Newport Fire Department, and multiple state and local teams coordinated by the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) were just a few of the organisations that received support.

In North Carolina, following an initial assessment by the RRT team, volunteers quickly organised a donation of

supplies, including Frontline Snack Packs, bottled water, toilet paper bales, and other essentials. These were delivered to Buncombe County Sheriff's Office, a distribution centre in Swannanoa, and directly to first responders leading the recovery effort. Volunteers also partnered with local authorities to clear debris from blocked roadways.

Since the initial effort, support has continued for affected residents, particularly for those who had lost everything.

The response to Hurricane Helene, along with the other incidents during 2024, has broadened our understanding of the many ways we can support impacted communities and emergency services in their time of need. Our teams have also grown in confidence and understanding of our strengths and capabilities. The experience has helped shape our strategic thinking, particularly around corporate partnerships and how to activate them during a crisis.

We know from experience recovering from a natural disaster takes years. We will continue to monitor community needs and provide support wherever possible to help restore normalcy.

Reflecting on 2024, it has been a pivotal year for the Caribbean team, including more proactive events, supported by a swathe of newly inducted volunteers, and a process geared towards readiness and quick response times.

Our emergency support started early in the year when Tobago faced an oil spill after a ship overturned 18 km off the coast. RRT CAR volunteers from Trinidad loaded the BBQ Trailer onto a ferry to make the 3.5 hour journey to support Tobago Emergency Management Agency.

This preparedness was certainly required when many parts of the Caribbean were impacted by Hurricane Beryl. Trinidad and Tobago escaped the worst of Beryl's wrath, though experienced heavy rains and severe flooding in Trinidad and Tobago.

However, the hurricane severely affected the Eastern Caribbean, with a direct hit to Grenada and the small islands of St. Vincent and the Grenadines on July 1st. Assessed as a Category 4 hurricane, winds of 130-156 mph (209-251 km/hr) were experienced, toppling trees and power lines, tearing roofs from houses, and blowing some buildings off their foundations.

Barbados and Jamaica were next to be affected, where residents had been preparing for the hurricane's arrival, stockpiling food, and then moving to shelters to seek safety. It has been reported that this was Jamaica's worst hurricane in 17 years.

After the storm subsided and the areas of need assessed, all five RRT CAR localities sprang into action. On the day of the hurricane, volunteers were able to deliver immediate relief to communities in Jamaica

and St. Vincent, setting a new RRT CAR response record. Teams from Kingston, Mandeville, Trinidad, and Barbados also helped those nearby, extending their support to as far as Grenada.

Typically, there is a waiting period before emergency supplies can be dispatched. However, RRT CAR mobilised volunteers four days prior to Beryl's landfall to prepare Snack Packs and supplies that could be easily distributed to emergency responders and impacted residents holed up in temporary shelters.

Within 24 to 48 hours of Hurricane Beryl making landfall, our teams were able to return with RRT Food Boxes, meals, water, and ice to help combat the intense summer heat.

Despite limited access due to wreckage and debris, RRT CAR were fortunate to partner with the Saint Vincent and the Grenadines Coast Guard, enabling us to deliver the aid.

It was an amazing effort by our volunteers, many of whom live in the areas impacted by the hurricane. As soon as it was safe, they were out in force, supporting those in need.

One of our key goals for next year will be to expand our existing asset base. Currently, we have two BBQ trailers based in Jamaica and Trinidad, our two largest regions. With the addition of two trailers to be based in Barbados and St. Vincent, we will be able to increase our impact.

Our proactive events reached a record high, buoyed by an increased number of inducted volunteers, which puts us in a great position as we look ahead to 2025.

'Proactive Compassion in Action' was the theme for RRT ARG volunteers in 2024. Thankfully, our Argentinian localities avoided any major emergencies or disasters, allowing our focus to be on proactive engagement with charities and agencies.

Argentina has three geographically dispersed localities, home to around 300 Community members. In 2024, we reached a new milestone of 100 inducted volunteers, 70% of whom are highly active.

With more volunteers on board and fewer reactive events, our teams were able to focus on raising awareness of RRT ARG - what we do and how we support our local communities.

Since Argentina is still in its early days as an official charitable entity, we haven't yet been top of mind for charities or agencies seeking support. This meant we had to take a more proactive approach, reaching out, rather than receiving opportunities for engagement. However, RRT ARG turned a corner this year, with teams spending more time on awareness raising and brand building. As a result, we saw a shift toward an inflow of requests for support from organisations, leading to a very solid year of events. New beneficiaries included local fire brigades, extending our emergency service support beyond the police force.

One event of note was when Rosario volunteers participated a new initiative by the Gendarmería Nacional to assist those experiencing hardship in some of the city's poorest areas. Sadly, Rosario,

Argentina's third-largest city, has a murder and crime rate five times the national average. Eight volunteers accompanied officers tasked with going door to door to check in on local residents. RRT ARG provided the officers with Food Boxes, which were used as a means to connect with locals, build relationships, and increase their sense of safety in an area where extreme poverty is surrounded by violence. It was a humbling experience for the volunteers, who would not have otherwise had the opportunity to visit these areas and meet these people. The experience has opened our eyes to the importance of building relationships with organisations such as the Gendarmería, which can help us reach those who are most in need.

In just our second year, we once again participated in the International Nurses Day campaign. This not only helped raise awareness of RRT ARG's capabilities but also demonstrated our consistency and reliability. In 2024, we delivered four events as part of this campaign, and we plan to replicate that again next year.

Looking ahead to 2025, we have our first BBQ Trailer now registered and ready to hit the road from its base in Rosario. However, with Buenos Aires 300km to the south and Bahía Blanca almost 800km further in the same direction, we are seeking sponsorship to fund the addition of two more trailers, ensuring each locality will have access to their own.

We look forward to building our capability and extending our reach as we become more widely recognised as a charity that supports communities in need.

RRT views corporate governance as an essential part of ensuring our directors around the globe address their corporate, legal, financial, and audit responsibilities, and exercise reasonable care, skill, and diligence in carrying out their duties.

RRT as a charity takes its responsibilities and corporate governance obligations seriously.

All RRT Directors are aware of their responsibilities and ensure RRT abides by its Constitution. The RRT Board's primary responsibilities are to;

- Establish long-term goals and approve strategic plans to achieve these goals and monitor progress.
- Ensure the appropriate separation of authority and balance of responsibilities between the Board and management.
- Review and approve annual budgets, monitor management and financial performance, and ensure that the organisation has the necessary skills, resources, and support.
- Identify significant organisational risks and ensure effective strategies are in place to manage these risks including adequate internal control systems and monitoring of compliance activities.
- Review and approve major strategies, financial objectives, and plans, including capital expenditures.

Further, the Board promotes ethical and responsible decision-making by ensuring that RRT conducts its business to the highest standards of honesty, integrity, respect, and fairness when dealing with members of the community and both internal and external stakeholders.
